Lighting the Path Forward

Charles Rohde Memorial Symposium Tuesday, January 23, 2024

Charles A. Rohde, PhD, professor and chair emeritus in Biostatistics, passed away on January 23, 2023 at the age of 85. During more than a half-century on the faculty, Chuck played a major role in shaping education programs in Biostatistics and the School. As department chair from 1981 to 1996, he built the Department into one of the nation's best by recruiting and mentoring many outstanding junior faculty and students. His faculty mentees ultimately became: chair of the schoolwide master of public health degree program, two department chairs, two school of public health deans, and a university president. Faculty and students remember him as a fierce and lifelong advocate for them.

Rohde Stories: Lighting the Path Forward, is a half-day symposium to tell Rohde Stories and stimulate creative ideas about how his legacy can light the path ahead to ever-more influential contributions to the public's health, including the role of biostatistics, data, and evidence in that.

After an opening session about the Rohde Half-Century+ (1965-2023), the program will comprise three sessions of Rohde stories about his scholarship, mentorship, and leadership. The stories will be told by Dr. Rohde's colleagues, mentees, students, and friends.
